

Felmeri's two week reprieve

The directors of embattled building firm Felmeri Group have been given two weeks to finalise a repayment plan for creditors, as they look to save the company from falling into the hands of liquidators.

About 25 creditors met in Adelaide on Monday where it was decided a second meeting of creditors – where the fate of

an insolvent company is typically decided –

would be adjourned in order to give directors more time to finalise their

proposed rescue bid. Speaking after the meeting, administrator Leigh Prior said the directors had until July 10 to submit their deed of company arrangement (DOCA) proposal.

He would then review the terms of the DOCA and issue a recommendation to creditors ahead of a rescheduled meeting on July 17.

"I gave creditors a chance to speak and there was no real push-back from creditors to allow for the adjournment.

"A DOCA may or may not come but there's no massive downside to adjourning for three weeks. If they (directors) communicate that that's (DOCA) not going to be the case then we'll reconvene the meeting, liquidate the company and get things moving."

Toddler killed in driveway

A toddler just weeks from his first birthday has been killed in his Deception Bay driveway, north of Brisbane, by a reversing car.

It is understood a male relative was driving the car when the boy was tragically struck and killed at his home about 10am on Monday.

Queensland Ambulance and several police crews attended the home, working to revive the young boy – who had sustained critical head injuries – and comfort the distraught family.

His paternal grandmother said she was "just numb".

"I can't believe it's happened to us," she said.

Oh baby, app shows growing IVF embryos

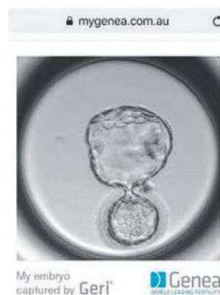
Prospective parents will be able to watch their IVF embryos grow by simply checking a phone app, under advanced technology coming to Adelaide.

The state's first Genea Fertility clinic has an incubation system with a time lapse video camera couples can check on their phone or computer before the embryo is implanted in the uterus.

It means the first baby photo from a successful pregnancy won't be a blurry ultrasound – it will be of cells dividing.

People will be able to see embryos developing for the first five days after fertilisation before they are either transferred into the uterus or frozen for future use.

Photographs taken every five minutes will be melded together to create a film.

Genea Fertility's Geri incubation system and time lapse camera technology allows embryologists to view the embryos as they develop and choose the best for transfer.

Genea Fertility's scientific director Steve McArthur said the close monitoring of embryos is crucial to increasing pregnancy and live birth rates.

"Our research found that when embryos are incubated in the undisturbed environ-

ment of the Geri, it improves our embryo utilisation rates by 24 per cent when compared with a traditional benchtop IVF incubator," he said.

"We also see an improvement in live birth rates with an increase of above 12 per cent."

Genea Fertility SA medical director Dr Bruno Radesic said the clinic's technology has been proven to deliver consistently high success rates above the national average.

"Undergoing fertility treatment can be a very stressful process for patients and knowing they have chosen a clinic with access to the best in science and technology can help to put their mind at ease during what can be a challenging time," he said.

Vanessa and Brendan Forsyth of Sydney had been trying to start a family for four years when they were referred to Genea Fertility in 2019.

One cycle of IVF led to the birth of three-year-old daughter Chloe. After another cycle Vanessa fell pregnant with a baby due in November.

Vanessa, 35, said the experience of watching their embryos develop on the Grow App was something she will never forget.

"Both for Chloe and for this baby, it was just mind-blowing to be able to see them develop and know that one of these

embryos would hopefully become our baby," she said.

"I downloaded all the images and videos for when the kids are older. We will be able to tell them how they came to be and show them what they started out as."

Brendan, 34, said the photos and video available on the Grow App helped the couple share their IVF journey with other family members.

"We were constantly sending the images to our parents and they were amazed at what we could see," he said.

"We were the first ones in either family to go through IVF so they had no idea what to expect either and it was nice to share this part with them."

Genea Fertility SA's clinic on King William St is a partnership between Genea Fertility and the former Fertility SA. It has 12 clinics across the country.
